This funding will be used to

- Raise the percentage of students attaining A-C in English to >70% from Year 1 to Year 6.
- Raise the percentage of students attaining A-C in Maths to >79% from Year 1 to Year 6.
- Raise the percentage of students attaining A-B in English to >39% from Year 1 to Year 6.
- Raise the percentage of students attaining A-B in Maths to >47% from Year 1 to Year 6.
- Raise the school attendance rate to >88%.
- Raise School Opinion Survey agreement data for "Student Behaviour is well managed at this school." to >90%.

Our initiatives include

- Sustaining existing initiatives to support the development of young learners, including Read Write Inc., Reading Intervention, Fly-in Squad and professional development targeting literacy and numeracy instruction.
- The continued support of a Community Hub to support transition phases, birth to 5 years literacy, and diverse family needs unique to the diverse and complex community.
- The continued implementation of Professional Learning Teams (PLTs) that facilitate collegial engagement, collective efficacy, data analysis and differentiated planning across the school.
- Support school-wide management of students through the enhancement of Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL), Essential Skills for Classroom Management (ESCM) Everyday Speech (SEL Program) and trauma informed practices. Continue to case manage students in relation to attendance.

• Purchase 2 additional 1.0 FTE teachers	\$169,500
• Purchase additional non-teaching hours	\$190,000
• Purchase additional OT (0.2 FTE)	\$22,000
• Purchase additional GO (0.2 FTE)	\$30,000
• Purchase TRS to support literacy and numeracy PD	\$10,000
• Resource support for literacy and numeracy strategies	\$16,702
• Co-contribution for Community Hub leader	\$20,000
